#### **CHRISTIAN ED TEAM**

Christian Education Team has accepted the resignation of one of their team members, Terra Norris- Gartmann. The Leadership Team expresses their gratitude to Terra for her service and dedication to this Team and to their work. In addition, Stephen Hershberger has submitted his resignation as chair and a member of this Team. Leadership is grateful to Stephen for the time and dedication he gave to this Team during 2024. His positive contributions and Christian education interests were much appreciated. At the 8/6/24 Leadership Team meeting, it was decided that the LT Exec Team will join with the remaining Christian Ed members to fill out the 2 recent vacancies until the end of 2024. The 2024 fall slate will present a new name to fill the chairperson position for 2025. Summer SS will end on 9-1. Rally Day "Round Up Sunday" will be held 9-8. Planning is going well. Bibles will be presented to children entering 1<sup>st</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grades. And all teachers and leaders of children's events will be recognized as well. The children's SS classes will be using "Shine" curriculum, and the Youth will be using "Generation Why;" these are both offered through Brethren Press. There are still a very few SS teacher vacancies that need filled. Please speak with Mindy Wagner or Angie Russell if you have an interest in co-teaching an Elementary or Jr. Youth class.

#### **HOSPITALITY & COMMUNICATIONS TEAM**

"Christmas in July" fundraiser netted \$1200 for the Roof Fund. A donation has been given to the Albright Church of the Brethren for the use of their activity center twice this summer. The recent church picnic had 70 people in attendance. Movie night for later in August has been postponed.

#### **WORSHIP TEAM**

The acolyte sign-up sheet at the Welcome Center seems to be working well. That will continue and those groups assigned to Sept-Dec will not need to be responsible. Chancel Choir will be back in worship some time in September. Ushers have been reminded to be certain the front doors to the church building are locked at the start of worship for safety reasons. Discussion on securing A/V and elevator operators for church funerals was discussed.

Elevator tech examined the elevator to determine why the door open and close requests lock so quickly when a call is not completed. It is because of a mandated "fault state sensor" with a 3-minute lapse from the time of the call. There is no way to change the sensor timer. Phone numbers of persons in the church who have a key to the elevator panel box located next to the elevator on the fellowship hall level will be placed inside the elevator so that someone can be called to come unlock the panel box and reset the elevator if someone gets stuck inside. The issue is that the accordion doors are not being completely closed when exiting the elevator.

Next meeting will be 9-15. There were 128 persons served In Pew Communion in July and there were 57 at the Outdoor Baptism.





# A Gentleman in Moscow by Amor Towles

In 1922, Count Alexander Rostov is deemed an unrepentant aristocrat by a Bolshevik tribunal, and is sentenced to house arrest in the Metropol, a grand hotel across the street from the Kremlin. Rostov, an indomitable man of erudition and wit, has never worked a day in his life, and must now live in an attic room while some of the most tumultuous decades in Russian history are unfolding outside the hotel's doors. Unexpectedly, his reduced circumstances provide him entry into a much larger world of emotional discovery.

Brimming with humor, a glittering cast of characters, and one beautifully rendered scene after another, this singular novel casts a spell as it relates the count's endeavor to gain a deeper understanding of what it means to be a man of purpose.





# Missions & Service Team Highlights - Heifer International

For more than 80 years, Heifer International has worked with people all around the world to end

hunger and poverty and care for the Earth. Roaring Spring 1<sup>st</sup> Church of the Brethren has supported Heifer International for many years as part of our mission to serve others in Jesus' name. This ministry was called Heifer Project while operated by the Church of the Brethren. It became an independent agency in recent decades.





In 1944, Church of the Brethren farmer Dan West began outlining a simple but

groundbreaking plan to tackle hunger around the world. West had recently returned from feeding weary refugees during volunteer service in the Spanish Civil War.

He'd seen firsthand that giving people food was a short-term solution, whereas providing them with animals offered a steady supply of nutritious food for an entire family. His philosophy still inspires Heifer's work today. Partnering with farmers across a range of different livestock and crops, we create

unique solutions to local challenges. Together, we build inclusive, resilient economies, so communities can develop effective ways to end global hunger and poverty in a sustainable way.



These days, Heifer International generally provides animals to participating families through local channels in the countries we serve.

But early on, the organization shipped livestock from the United States to other countries. During their travels, these animals were cared for by "seagoing cowboys": ranchers and farmers who aided Heifer in its mission by lending their expertise in animal husbandry and agriculture. Local Morrisons Cove folks joined in donations and travel, including people from our congregation.







Heifer International distributes animals, along with agricultural and value-based training, to families in need around the world as a means of providing self-sufficiency. Recipients must agree to "pass on the gift" by donating animal offspring, as well as sharing the skills and knowledge of animal husbandry and agricultural training with other impoverished families in the community.

We are glad to be part of God's work through Heifer International!


